"The Sphere" and us: On Nov. 8, 15 PVV members and guests visited JMU's Science on a Sphere (SOS). Volunteer guide Ben Lundy (employed by JMU's Parking Services) treated us to video projections on the sphere-shaped visualization tool developed by the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration (NOAA). Topics included energy (its creation and distribution); radioactivity (how wind currents spread particles from Japan's Fukushima meltdown); "dark sky" concerns (how human-made lighting impacts night sky visibility); and global Internet connection patterns. The Sphere also briefly took on the role of the sun, revealing its spots and storms, and served as setting for a video about climate change challenges and strategies that Ben noted was "more informational than scary." **January 14, 2014** @ 8 AM at VMRC's Detweiler Auditorium: Meeting of the **Healthy Community Council**. The focus will be a presentation by the Neighborhood Action group on the resources that are available from the city for neighborhood groups. This event is open to interested community members.

Jan. 14, 7pm, PVMC Fireplace Room: PVV program on the crises in Syria and Jordan. Our presenter, J. Daryl Byler, Executive Director for EMU's Center for Justice and Peacebuilding, has lived and worked in Jordan. He writes, "The crisis in Syria will soon be three years old. Nearly half of the population is uprooted from their homes, including nearly 600,000 Syrian refugees in neighboring Jordan. Is there any end in sight? How are the Mennonite Central Committee and other aid agencies responding to the crisis? The presentation will focus on a brief analysis of the conflict and stories of MCC partners in Jordan who have mounted a major response to the refugees who have flooded into this resource-challenged country."

# **Board President Update**

Park View Village is entering our third year of operation in January 2014. During this Thanksgiving season, I am thankful for active members who are committed to developing Park View and the surrounding neighborhoods as a vibrant, healthy community.

This year three people are leaving the board. I am grateful for the service provided by Norm Gerber, Yvonne Stutzman, Secretary, and Cindy Smoker. For several years, Cindy has gladly volunteered her time and impressive skills in capacities that include Membership Committee Chair as well as Administrator – maintaining our database, website and mailings.

The Nominating Committee, chaired by Yvonne, is preparing a slate of new board members. The new board members will be introduced in our January newsletter.

In November, a few PVV members explored Village initiatives in other communities:

- I visited Beacon Hill Village in Boston, MA, the first "village program," launched ten years ago. I met with Laura Conners, the current Executive Director, and Susan McWhinney-Morse, one of the organization founders. It was exciting to observe the office buzz as staff and volunteers responded to member inquiries and promoted activities developed by village members. Beacon Hill Village, with approximately 400 members, has formed numerous "interest groups" around food, travel, art, politics, and gender. One group was meeting to discuss travel to Israel. Another example, a men's group, was visiting neighborhood "water holes."
- Paul Yoder and John Spicher attended the Village to Village Network Annual Gathering in St. Louis November 11-13. Representatives of 123 Villages attended. Please read their full report below.

- Helping others in the neighborhood
- Maintaining age diversity by inviting households of all life stages to join
- Welcoming new members to the neighborhood
- Building a community that promotes healthy interdependency rather than independence

# **Village to Village Movement Growing Across Continent**

The gathering hosted 207 people from both open and developing Villages in the US, and one from Canada. -- Paul Yoder

John Spicher, Park View Village member, and I (Paul Yoder, board treasurer), spent November 11-13 in St. Louis at the 5<sup>th</sup> Annual National Village Gathering. Over 200 participants met to share ideas and hear from successful Villages from east to west coasts.

Some of the Villages use all-volunteer board and staff while others use from one to four paid or full-time-equivalent staff. We were among the few men at the Village to Village Gathering. Eighty-one percent of attendees were women. Village to Village Network is a national organization, organized 5-years ago as a resource for the growing number of Villages across North America, of which Park View Village is a member.

The success of a Village appears to be focused on three major ingredients:

- Strategic partner participation that provides services and, in some cases, also funding for services to the growing number of older members within a community.
- 2. Leadership that provides motivation and participation of volunteers at all levels.
- 3. Publicity that keeps members, volunteers and the public informed about the Villages' activities.

The enthusiasm shared by many of the presenters was convincing. They shared excitement about a phenomenon that has grown since 2001 from one Village to over 100 open Villages, in just 12 years! Also attending were an additional 20-plus Villages in development, (not yet ready to invite members to join). According to VTV Network, over 200 Villages are either open or in development. Growth has been most prevalent during the past 5 years! Membership costs range from \$120 per year, per household to over \$1,200. Most

volunteer Village membership costs are on the low side. (Park View Village's fees are among the lowest.)

Cost of living is a major factor in pricing structures as well as for those with paid staff, usually with degrees in the field of social services. Strategic partnerships, such as alliances with hospitals, retirement communities, local merchants and universities can expand the reach of the Village's services. Use of social media, especially Facebook and Linked-In, has proved successful. However, use of local, traditional media was also cited as highly effective.

Recruiting and training volunteers is also necessary for a Village to succeed and expand.

Paid staff is not necessarily a requirement for a Village to be successful. However, a paid staff person is important in fulfilling needed service requirements and managing and training volunteers. In some cases leadership, training and follow-up is done with volunteers. Pubic relations strategy is key to making this work. Involvement can include a commitment for as little as one hour, one time to fulfill a task for a member. It may also include a member willing to host a living room chat session, providing coffee and tea, where members are encouraged to share what they need from their Village.

Recruiting was emphasized as NOT selling, but listening to what members are experiencing.

Publicity can be done by a volunteer retiree willing to pitch articles and information to potential media. Facebook was considered an effective tool that can be managed by a student willing to commit a weekly scheduled time allotment to the project.

As seniors age, while having fewer children or grandchildren nearby, need for services increases. Many seniors are not willing or able to pay for services of a retirement facility. Today's baby boomers want to age and die in their own homes. However, their needs will increase with age. This is where the Village concept becomes more important. Children live in distant parts of the country and are not available to take care of aging parents. So the social integration of a community is met by the "Village" concept, whether a church, neighborhood, or Village.

One presenter suggested that social services may ask if you need help and if you say "no" one time, that may be the end of the communication. A Village is expected to always be there and continue to check up on members. Park View Village wants to be that kind of a service for its members.
