

CELEBRATING A PIECE OF NEIGHBORHOOD HISTORY

In our neighborhood in 1964, Park School quietly became the first racially integrated school in Rockingham County or Harrisonburg. A Sept. 4, 2017 article in The Daily News-Record tells of Samuel and Lucille Ewell, an African American couple, moving to the Valley so their five children could attend school after Prince Edward County, Va., their former home, closed all schools in 1959 to prevent integration. Park School, a.k.a. Park Elementary School, then a three-room Rockingham County public school, was located "just southwest of Park Woods" and near the present site of Eastern Mennonite School, says the website that announced a Sept. 3 alumni reunion. (The Park View neighborhood was then part of Rockingham County.) At the reunion, approaching the school's, and EMU's, centennial, several of the Ewell children, present and/or in a video recently recorded by Broadway High School students, shared memories of the warm welcome given them by classmates and by the local, mostly Mennonite community.
